



How should the federal budget reflect Americans' priorities?

For the Federal Government to provide the services necessary for the well-being of the nation, it requires a large amount of revenue. At times, the government must borrow heavily to provide these services. As you read the quotations about financing government below, consider the expectations of the American public and their concerns about the national debt.

The constitutional purpose of a budget is to make government responsive to public opinion and responsible for its acts.

— William Howard Taft

A national debt, if it is not excessive, will be to us a national blessing.

— Alexander Hamilton, Letter to Robert Morris, April 30, 1781

If the Nation is living within its income, its credit is good. If, in some crises, it lives beyond its income for a year or two, it can usually borrow temporarily at reasonable rates. But if . . . it throws discretion to the winds . . . [and] it extends its taxing to the limit of the people's power to pay and continues to pile up deficits, then it is on the road to bankruptcy.

— Franklin Delano Roosevelt, presidential campaign speech, 1932
