# Chapter 19 Section 3: Freedom of Speech and Press

Guiding Question: What are the limits on the guarantees of free speech and free press?

## **GET STARTED**

### **Lesson Goals:**

- ☐ Students will identify the limits on and protections of freedom of speech.
- ☐ Students will understand prior restraint.
- ☐ Students will identify the limits on and protections of freedom of the press.

**Bellringer** Write the following on the board, and have students answer in their notebooks:

"One man's vulgarity is another's lyric."

—Supreme Court Justice John M. Harlan ("Vulgarity" is something offensive.)

- 1. What did Harlan mean by this remark?
- 2. How does his comment capture the fundamental issue of freedom of speech?

**Vocabulary** Have students break into small groups and create crossword puzzles. Have groups exchange their puzzles and solve them.

## **TEACH**

Discuss the Bellringer. Students should recognize that Justice Harlan's point is that the definition of *vulgarity* varies depending on one's opinion. Explain that in this section students will learn about the freedoms of speech and press guaranteed by the 1st Amendment. Read the section as a class one paragraph at a time, and have volunteers summarize each paragraph before moving on to the next.

#### Ask:

- What is sedition? (Sedition is the effort of people or groups to overthrow or harm the government using violence. It is a crime.)
- What does the Espionage Act make illegal? (to encourage disloyalty in the military or to speak or print disloyal statements about the government)
- What is prior restraint? (*Prior restraint is the placing of a ban on written or spoken words before they are expressed.*)

## Learning Styles: Body/Kinesthetic

Organize students into small groups or pairs. Have them prepare for a talk show on the topic of freedom of the press, slander, and libel. Is it libel when a movie star, politician, or professional athlete is portrayed in a magazine or newspaper as having a substance-abuse problem or having extramarital affairs? Is it slander when a local citizen is publicly accused by another of taking bribes? Have groups present their talk shows to the class.
